Keynote Address: "COVID in the Rear View: Where Do We Go from Here"

During this session, the participants will take time to pause and reflect on the impact of COVID and its aftermath in the early childhood classrooms. The pandemic brought on deep feelings of uncertainty, fear, and isolation. Since returning to the classrooms, our early learners are letting us know through their behaviors what they need from us. We will be discussing how teachers and staff can be a "secure base and safe haven" for our students to feel safe while learning. Throughout the session, we will also reflect on what it means to be an early childhood educator in a time when social and emotional needs are just as important as academic needs. Participants will leave this session with a deeper understanding of attachment theory and how to implement it in their classrooms to build social and emotionally attuned classrooms.



Ms. Marianela S. Rodousakis, LCSW-C is a licensed clinical social worker who serves as Assistant Director for a therapeutic preschool in Maryland. For four years, she served as the classroom social worker providing integrated education and therapeutic care. She considers herself an Early Childhood Champion, advocating for young children and families to gain access to quality education and that they are treated with dignity and respect no matter where they come from. Prior to finding her passion for working in developmental trauma, Ms. Rodousakis was an early childhood teacher in various educational settings. Ms. Rodousakis is also a certified Circle of Security facilitator for both the Parenting and Classroom models,

working with parents and coaching preschool through pre-K and K teachers to help improve teacher and child outcomes through the context of attachment. Most recently she completed her training to become a Circle of Security Coach. Ms. Rodousakis earned an Associate Degree in Early Childhood Education from Community College Baltimore County, a Bachelor's degree in Family Science at the University of Maryland (College Park), then a Masters in Social Work with a concentration in clinical, and specialization in Families and Children, from the University of Maryland, Baltimore.

They firmly hold the belief that instilling kindness in young children is akin to imparting foundational skills such as numerical and alphabetical knowledge. Through this opportunity, Kiran and Margy hope to extend their work beyond the premises of their classroom, to the beautiful MAESA community.

Kiran Philip is an educator of 20 years (in 2 countries), working both as a teacher and as Director for Afterschool and Extended Day at Christ Episcopal School and at Kids Town Learning Center. Over the last 5 years, Kiran has enjoyed being a Preschool Teacher at St. Andrew's Episcopal School in Potomac, MD. Kiran holds an Early Childhood Trainer license through MSDE Office of Childcare in the State of Maryland. She is passionate about teaching young children and, in particular, exploring the intersection of Mind, Brain, Education Science (MBE) and creating a learning environment that builds a sense of community and cultivates empathy in our younger students. She holds a strong philosophy that by prioritizing care and compassion, schools can cultivate a safe and supportive community where everyone feels seen, heard, valued, and supported, ultimately enhancing well-being, learning, and overall school success.

Margaret Hemmig has been a preschool teacher at St. Andrew's Episcopal School for 20 years. Workshop 3

The View from My Desk

This workshop will take a bird's eye view of your classroom community and explore how you connect to each student. This is an engaging, hands-on, interactive and participatory workshop and participants will leave having a better understanding of their classroom relationships. In addition to independent schools, she has worked in private practice, therapeutic preschool programs, early intervention services, and inpatient behavioral health settings. She has presented at various early childhood conferences in the DC area and is licensed in Maryland and DC. In addition, she provides clinical supervision to early career social workers and has a special interest in building the home-school connection.

"Narrativity and Healing:" Godly Play as Pastoral, Reflective Practice in Early Childhood Chapel

In a post-covid reality, educational and therapeutic practices must encourage profound attentiveness to the needs of teachers and learners. In this respect, whole school communities are encouraged to reflect on their life stories as part of their learning experience. This workshop will explore the use of Godly Play in Early Childhood Chapel, in particular, how worship can become a space both for prayer and exploring broader concerns in the wider school community. Recent research has demonstrated that Godly Play can also be effective in the classroom as an academic religious studies tool, and in therapeutic and meditative practice with adults, too. In many cases, parents and teachers find themselves contemplating their own well-being by listening to stories and the reflections of their young students.

In this session, there will be a short Godly Play story, followed by a time of "wondering" about the story, and then a discussion forum. Participants will have the opportunity to consider how Godly Play might be integrated into Chapel programs, and how storytellers—chaplains, educators, and children alike—can utilize this method beyond the worship space. Participants will be invited to consider how pertinent themes and concerns in a school community might be addressed through the power of creative play.

Edward Thornley is Associate Rector and Chaplain to St. Patrick's Episcopal Church and Day School. Originally from the UK, Fr. Ed was ordained in the Church of England after studying theology at Exeter, Cambridge, and Yale. He served in parish ministries, and in school, university, and healthcare chaplaincies in the Dioceses of Norwich and London, as well as Fort Worth, TX, before joining St. Patrick's in July 2020. Fr. Ed has a passion for serving at the intersection of church and education. He is currently a doctoral candidate and postgraduate researcher in Divinity at the University of Aberdeen, UK, where his academic work encompasses the theology of school chaplaincy and interreligious dialogue.

Workshop 5

Using LGBTQIA+ and Gender Expansive Books in the Early Grades

We will address best practices for using books with N-PK students and families, censorship, and ways to approach challenges. Participants will experience both large and small group discussions, as well as hands-on and self-discovery activities for reflection and growth during the workshop. Participants will have the opportunity to read a variety of picture books. This workshop is great for preschool and lower school teachers.

Mara Rosenberg is a Teacher Librarian who believes that books serve as a pathway for children to understand themselves and the world around them. She was an early elementary educator for 15 years. She has presented at local, regional, and national conferences. Mara holds a B.S. in Early Childhood Education from Colby Sawyer College, and M.Ed. in Literacy Education K-12 from Queens University, and an M.L.I.S. from University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

Jamila Zahra Felton is an artist, educator, and school librarian with over twenty years of experience educating children, teens, and adults. She graduated from Spelman College and holds an Ed.M. from Harvard University and an M.L.I.S. from The Catholic University of America. Jamila currently serves as a judge for the 2024 Judging Committee for The Walter Dean Myers Awards for Outstanding Children's Literature.
